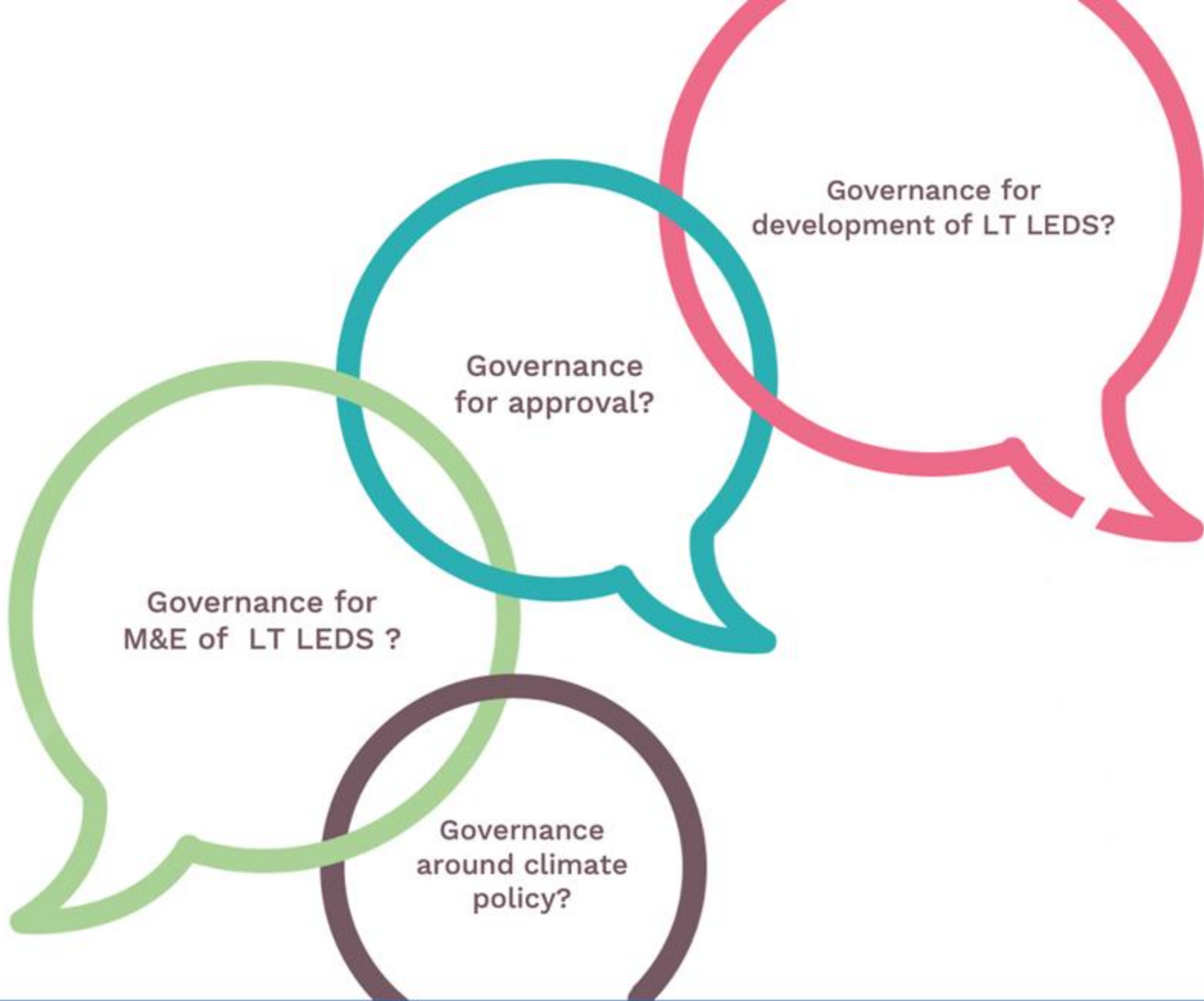

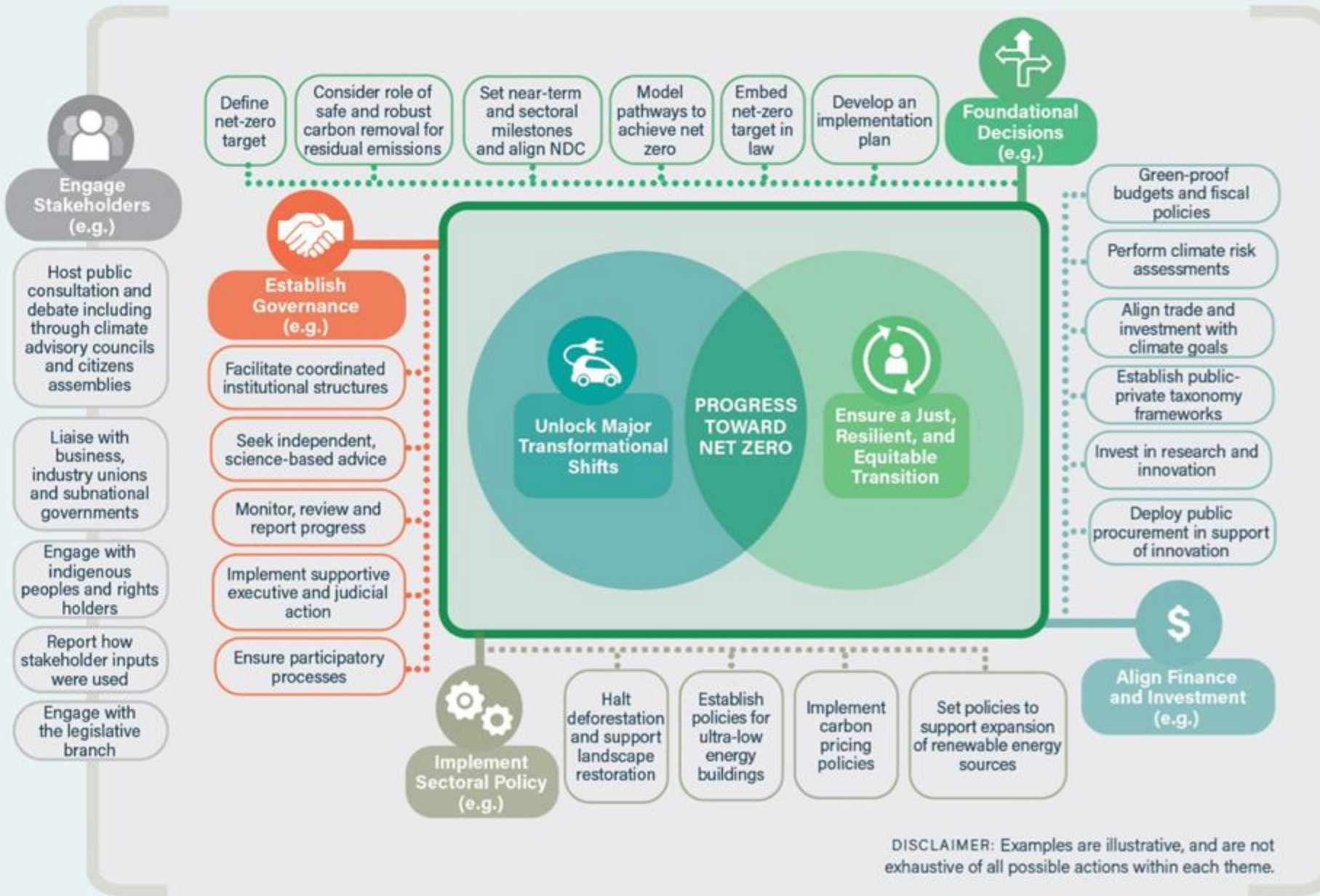

Effective Governance towards operationalization of LT LEDS





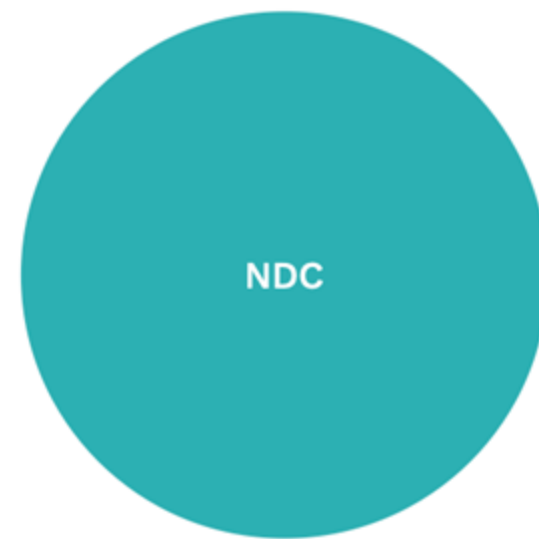
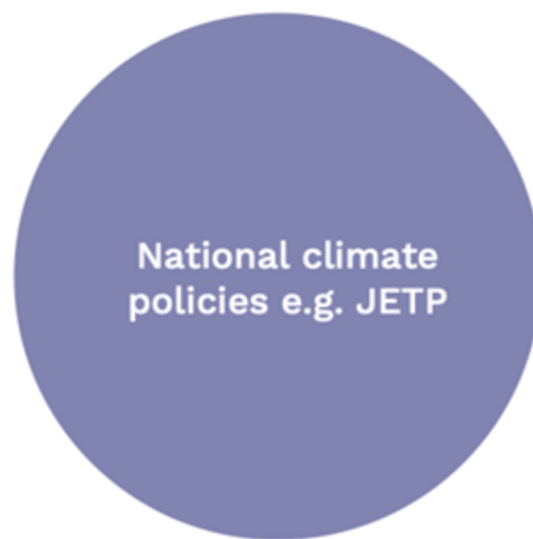
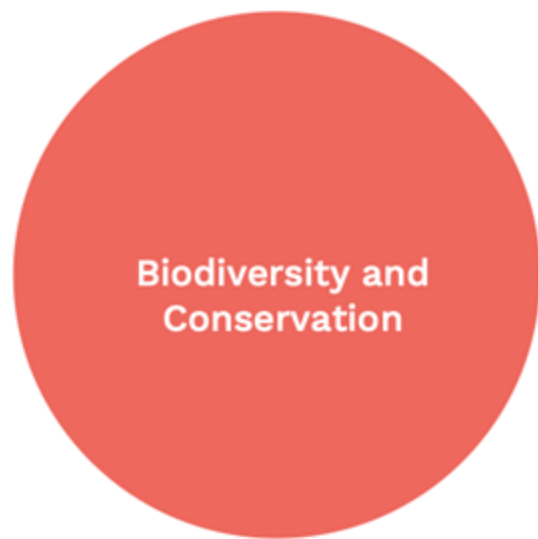
DISCLAIMER: Examples are illustrative, and are not exhaustive of all possible actions within each theme.

At COP26, members of the Carbon Neutrality Coalition resolved to develop a framework reflecting a common understanding of how best to build and implement plans to reach net-zero emissions. Recognizing the many challenges to be overcome to unlock a net-zero climate-resilient and just future, and acknowledging that no jurisdiction has completed the needed transition, this framework presents elements vital to reach our common goal.

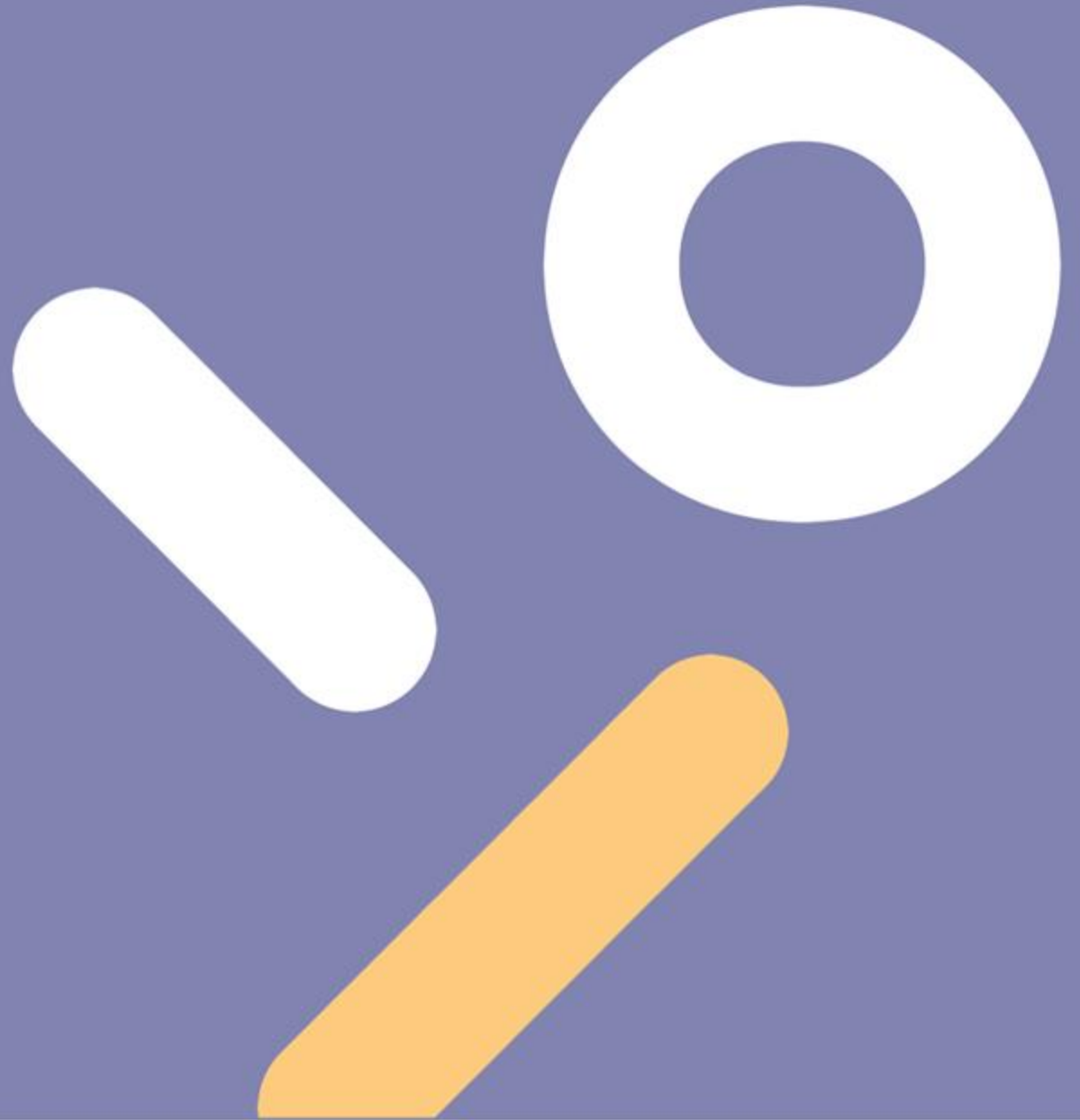
Some characteristics of Governance Frameworks

- 1. Permanance & Flexible** : Effective climate governance practices should be able to withstand minor changes in political conditions and are not easily reversible in the policy-making process
- 2. Participatory**: Inclusive and aimed at increasing the effectiveness and responsiveness of public policy-making activities.
- 3. Accountable**: There are different dimensions including answerability, enforcement, and responsibility, and different modes including traditional (focused on regularity and compliance) and performance-based.
